



Future Plans and Past Accomplishments for the 4th-of-July Pass Cross-Country Ski and Snowshoe trail system:

Using funds raised by the sale of Park-N-Ski stickers, Club events, and grants the Club is planning to improve and expand the existing trail system and its amenities. Construction of several small sheltered benches is planned and more snowshoe trails have been added along with a revised snowshoe shelter.

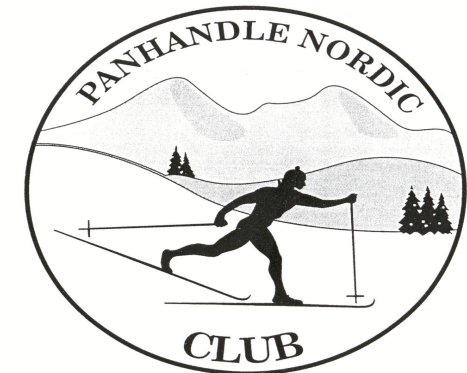

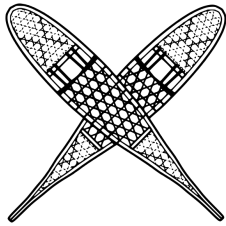

The Panhandle Nordic Ski and Snowshoe Club was founded in 1988 by North Idahoans who were interested in promoting cross country skiing in this area. The club members come from all walks of life, and welcomes people of all ages and skill levels. The main purpose is to promote winter sports, but the secondary purpose is to foster good fellowship. The club sponsors day trips and long weekend ski and snowshoe trips as well as summer hikes and backpacking trips. Occasionally a bicycle trip or canoe/kayak trip or a camp out are included in the list of activities for the summer months. Monthly meetings in the winter include interesting

programs relating to winter and summer sports. The club also offers free cross country ski lessons. **A Park N Ski Sticker** is required to use the 4th of July Recreation Area December thru April.
